

## Parking & Towing Q&As



Parking laws are meant to keep drivers, cyclists, and pedestrians safe. Officers issue citations while on patrol and when residents make complaints. Common violations include expired registration, 72-hour parking, no stopping, and fire lane violations. State law (22650 CVC) was changed in 2019 and created an additional rule for police to remove vehicles (Assembly Bill 2876). A violation of law alone does not authorize the removal of a vehicle by a police officer, there must be a community caretaking function (CCF). A CCF means that there is a need to remove a vehicle to protect public safety, such as obstructing traffic, a safety hazard (broken glass, leaking oil, public health), or is vulnerable to vandalism or theft. In effect, vehicles can be towed but with significant limitations.



## How do police remove vehicles?

The process starts with a Citizen complaint or an officer on patrol observing a violation. Below are the steps:

- **1.** Officer checks vehicle for violation (for example 72 hour, abandoned, expired registration, street maintenance/repairs)
- 2. Officer tags and logs vehicle and returns after 72 hours (if necessary)
- **3.** If no community caretaking need is present, the officer may issue a warning or citation
- **4.** If there is a community caretaking need present, then the officer may remove the vehicle.



## **Common vehicle removal codes:**

**14602.6 CVC** – driving without a license or with a suspended license **22651 CVC** – expired registration over 6 months, parked over 72 hours, obstructing a fire hydrant, obstructing street repair/maintenance, obstructing driveway\*

**22669 CVC** – abandoned vehicle (missing parts making them unsafe to drive or inoperable and a hazard)

\* Due to COVID-19, the DMV has extended vehicle registrations.
